

# Preparing the IT professionals for 2010

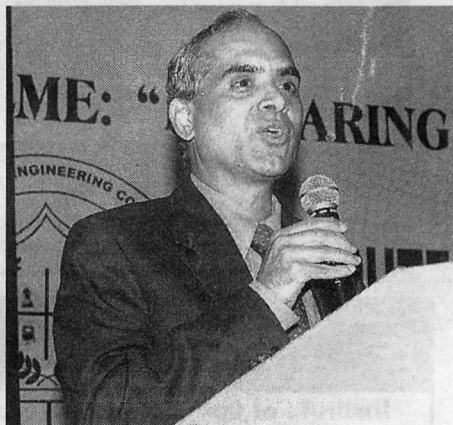
